# Senior Assessment and Tertiary Entrance Information Evening



#### Introduction

The Queensland Government will introduce new senior assessment and tertiary entrance systems with Year 11 students in 2019.

Key changes:

-introduce common external assessment

-strengthen the quality and comparability of school-based assessment

-replace the Overall Position (OP) with the Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR).



#### Why the new systems are being introduced?

- Queensland's current senior assessment system began in the early 1980s. The OP system was introduced in 1992.
- In a 2014 report, the Australian Council for Educational Research (ACER) said these arrangements were fair and reliable, but would not be sustainable in the long term.
- ACER recommended changes to achieve greater rigour and simplicity.



### **Student Preparation**

- Implementation of the Australian Curriculum in Years 9 10 was a school focus in 2017
- Targeting key teaching skills through the Art and Science of Teaching and our Literacy and Numeracy strategies to prepare students for learning
- Year 10 ESP program focused on Career Development to ensure students are aware of the senior options and pathways available to them.



### **Staff Preparation**

- Development of the ACSHS SATE Implementation Plan
- Review of Curriculum offerings to align to our student needs and our resources
- Participation in syllabus workshops provided by QCAA to familiarise staff
- Identification of school systems required to transition to the new system



#### Transition activities to date

- QCAA has redeveloped more than 70 senior syllabuses
- New processes developed and trialled to strengthen schoolbased assessment
- External assessments trialled in seven subjects with more than 20,000 students
- Methodology to calculate ATARs in development
- Thousands of teachers and other education partners engaged in the change process.



#### How have the subjects changed?

- General Subjects These subjects will have more academic rigour and students will need to do at least 4 General subjects to receive an ATAR. General subjects will have a combination of internal and external assessment. There is a general subject that closely aligns to the current authority (OP) subjects we currently offer. Eg Maths C → Specialised Mathematics
- Applied Subjects These align to the Authority registered subjects that we currently offer and should continue to have the same name eg Hospitality Practices



## How is tertiary entrance changing?

In 2020, if you're eligible, you'll be ranked for university using the ATAR.

A broad range of courses can contribute to the ATAR:

- Five General subjects; or
- Four General subjects, and one VET qualification at Certificate III or above; or
- Four General subjects, and one Applied subject.
- To be eligible, you'll also need to pass an English subject, but your result will only contribute to your ATAR if it's one of your best five subject results.
- Your ATAR will be calculated and issued by the Queensland Tertiary Admissions Centre. Visit its website for



### How will subjects be assessed?

- Applied subjects and year 11 subjects will still be graded A E
- All subjects will have 4 assessment items in Year 12
- General subjects will have 3 internal assessment items and 1 externally written and marked assessment item (it will be assessed at school)
- Students will be given a result for each subject out of 100 for general subjects. This result will be used by QTAC to calculate each student's ATAR.
